Greens Committee Meeting Notes 10.30am March 3rd 2015

Apologies;. None.

Matters arising;

New bunker on 6th in play and green keepers happy with the way it has settled down.

Fine turf for the rear of the 8^{th} now completed and the remove turf reused to improve an area near the 5^{th} green. The clearing of the land to the left of the 8^{th} fairway has been completed but garden waste and vegetables have appeared again. If any member identifies a person dumping rubbish to the

left of the dyke adjacent to the house boundaries, please report to the secretary.

Green Keepers Report

Once again we have experienced a mild, wet winter. This is not good news for any golf course, least of all for those unfortunate to be based on London clay. I am hopeful that March will be dry and that we can revert to being a properly playable golf course again.

During the winter period the greens are mown at a height of cut of 6mm which will be gradually lowered as regular growth kicks in. At present we endeavour to mow the greens at least once a week. However this is dependent on the greens not being too wet.

We actually had a brief dry period at the beginning of February and we took the opportunity to aerate the greens, surrounds and tees. This was the first chance to aerate the greens since they were vertidrained last September in maintenance week.

When conditions are suitable we will apply the spring topdressing which does contain a small amount of fertilizer.

We shall also soon commence the monthly applications of seaweed extract, iron and turf surfactant.

As regards to winter works you will have noticed the new bunker on the 6^{th} which has replaced the largely redundant bunker behind the 5^{th} green. We have also stripped the turf from the bank immediately behind the 8^{th} green and replaced it with a much finer quality turf. The stripped turf was used to the left of the 5^{th} green after 3.5 tonnes of root zone was applied to soften the contours of the existing mound. All these works will be in play once spring kicks in properly. We have also filled in some sunken areas, notably behind the 2^{nd} green and in front of the 4^{th} green.

In the near future we will be divotting all the fairways as usual as well as filling in any damaged sunken areas.

The tree roots around the 4th/8th/9th tees will be looked at in the early spring. We believe a digger is needed to excavate trenches to cut the roots.

Green keepers to prioritize areas that would benefit from Astoturf paths after a second wet winter.

Shoe cleaning brushes replaced on some points with others to be replaced shortly.

All machinery is being serviced at the moment. The 2 most important machines have been completed. The compressor is working properly. The proposed new tee boards will be discussed and positions identified after this meeting. President to obtain sponsors for this project. Damage to 2nd green by seagulls has lessoned slightly.
