PLANNING PERMISSION

Following the public exhibition in May we have made some amendments to the Plans which are available in the office for all members to view.

Virtually all the information and professional Reports have now been obtained and we are hoping to submit the Planning Application for the development of 3 detached houses to the Council in late September. Plans for the new Clubhouse will be incorporated but purely to indicate our intentions for use of the sale proceeds from the land. Planning Permission for the new Clubhouse will not be applied for at least another year.

PROPERTY DAMAGE OFF THE COURSE

We regularly get claims from our neighbours relating to damage caused by golf balls to their property. This is a significant cost to the Club as we have a £350 Excess applicable to this type of Insurance claim, and not many claims exceed this.

Recently there has been a dramatic increase in the number of claims for no obvious reasons — which have come from all sides of the course but mainly from the caravan park where there are often children playing Please ensure that you shout fore loudly, apologise to those affected and report every incident in the relevant book in the foyer.

Clubhouse Hire

The clubhouse can be hired by members for events such as a birthday party. First call should be with the Club Steward and /or the Office to check availability. There is a hire form that needs to be filled out (copies are

available from the office) in advance of the event. Our caterers are to be used for any food requirements.

There is a charge for hire of £100.
