IMPORTANT INFORMATION

New Red Penalty Area

The ditches, pond and thick rough which extends to and coincide with the boundary fence at the left hand side of the 5th fairway is now a **Red Penalty Area.**

<u>This new red penalty area is marked by red posts</u>. When a player's ball lands in this penalty area, including when it is known or virtually certain to be in that area even though not found, the player may play the ball as it lies or for a one shot penalty take relief outside the penalty area using one of the options under Rule 17.1d

As the edge of this new red penalty area coincides with the boundary of the course, opposite side relief is available when considering where the same or another ball should be dropped.
